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RELEASE VS. CONTROL

Control it or release it? Every parent has victories and failures with this stage of growing up. It comes with the territory that there will be moments that we feel certain we handled appropriately and then marvel as the wheels fall off! As a parent and a youth worker, I recognize from both sides just how difficult this can be.

Here's a personal example: Recently, my son wanted to go to the skate park with friends. It was late and I wasn't sure it was a good idea. The "control" side of me said no with a few enumerated reasons. That didn't go over well. The wheels began to come off because he felt unheard and uncared for. Still, in this instance, releasing control didn't seem right. So we strive for balance.

Here are some tips: 1. Think about the big issues Where do you want to have more boundaries? Have a conversation with your student about those issues at a safe time, not in the moment of decision-making.

2. Give them a chance to talk. Listen to their perspective. (In all honesty, this is my area of struggle.)

3. Provide opportunity for kids to make decisions. Then allow them to face the consequences. Be wise – start with small choices that won't derail their lives if they make the wrong choice.

4. Talk to other parents. Ask questions about how they deal with this issue. Build community with those who may have already figured out great ways releasing and holding on.

5. Pray and ask God to lead your decisions.

FREEDOM TO EXPLORE

Exploring culture is very different now than it was when we were all kids. The availability of television, movies, radio and more via digital content on the internet means our kids can explore so much so quickly. It can be amazing that they can access so much great stuff. As parents, we have the privilege and responsibility to help them navigate this cyber highway of information and to provide guidance about how it intersects their faith and culture. We do this by helping them look for God's truth in media. Sometimes that's as simple as asking the question "Did you see or hear anything in that which makes you think or engage with God?" Often, you'll be blown away by the depth of their answers because many students are really aware of how their spiritual life connects with the world. You could also try searching phrases like "God in movies" or "Faith in music" in an internet search engine or experiment with your own search terms. You will likely find some great resources to help you engage in meaningful conversation with your son or daughter while helping them navigate faith, culture, and their world. It's also important to be aware that not all of culture is 'good.'

Sometimes our teenagers will get into places and things that they feel like they shouldn't have. Helping them develop their filter builds confidence in their own decision-making as they interact with media and the world around them.

EXPLORE RESPONSIBILITY

As your kids navigate the wide wide world of web, remember there are sinister forces lurking just on the other side of the screen. Be sure to take precautions to safeguard your kids as they interact online.

1. Keep the computer in a public space.

2. Set time limits for recreational computer use.

3. Install accountability software like Covenant Eyes or XXXChurch.

4. Always set privacy limits on social media.

5. Remind your student to keep personal information (like grade, birthdate, school, etc.) to a minimum.

6. Insist that your teenager only interact with people they know personally.

GET APP EDUCATED

While smart phones are becoming more common among moms and dads, many apps are still an enigma – especially those apps our kids love.

Kill two birds with one stone! Have your kids 'school' you on how to use certain apps on their phones. You succeed in keeping communication lines open and flowing and your kids feel like they have taught you something in the process. Yes, you'll need to tolerate the rolling of the eyes and smug laughter that signals how dumb you are...it's part of the plan! You are empowering your teenager and, at the same time, indicating you don't know everything. It's a win-win. Kids love feeling smarter than their parents (we already know they're thinking it) and parents who are humble win major points at home!

And the bonus? You've just learned a whole lot about the technology your teenager interacts with every day.
